Featuring two speakers:

Madelyn Cirinna, club member, horse owner and West Newbury's Animal Control Officer will talk about emergency preparedness, barn safety and what to do in case of fire, flood or electrical disasters as well potential trailer towing accidents.

Richard Bourgault, of Farm Family Insurance, a resident of Amesbury and a Morgan judge, will address insurance and liability issues for you, your property and your horse. What is the minimum coverage you should have and what decisions should you make now if faced with a serious injury or colic surgery in the future?

February 7— 7pm Special Help for Special Circumstances: the Role of MSPCA

Jennifer Brockway, club member and Assistant Manager for the MSPCA's Equine and Farm Animal Care and Adoption Center will explain how to report suspected animal abuse or neglect and what happens when law enforcement is involved.

"At Nevins" she says "we take in horses

and farm animals that law enforcement seizes or gets signed over and are responsible for their rehabilitation, care, and hopefully adoption (depending on the case). As the only shelter that cares for horses and farm animals within the organization (and really the state) we may have the animals that are seized for a long time--often well over a year-- until the court case is resolved. It has a huge impact on the staff, our ability to offer services to individual owners in need as well as a financial impact on the organization. Unfortunately, there has definitely been an increase in big cases in the last two years."

Brenda Bonnette, club member and part time employee of the MSPCA with the Equine Ambulance Program will also talk about her experience of performing emergency rescues.

Not only did our MSPCA develop the Rescue Glide for moving downed horses, it has trained more than 4,000 professionals from around the globe in rescue and transport techniques.

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A Tribute to Mary Lee Mahoney by Amy Bresky

I admit I have been putting off writing this not because I don't have anything to say but because I have too much to get into words properly. As you all know, our co-chair, Mary Lee, has headed off to a new phase in her life in Woodstock, VT. On May 21st, she married a wonderful man, Phil Camp. Many of you have met Phil and know that he passed all the tests for a suitable match for this special person, including the full torture of hunts, hunt breakfasts, WNRDC meetings, Pipestave events, and every other version of Mary Lee's horsey world. He handled it all with grace and love and is about as perfect a non-horse person as I could imagine for Mary Lee.

Mary Lee sold her home on Main St. to another horseperson (yeah!) and she and Phil are enjoying living in a beautiful log cabin on a lake that has been in Phil's family for several generations. Phil has renovated it from a seasonal cottage into a lovely year-round home. Mary Lee has moved her faithful horse, Pete, near them and is enjoying the miles of trails. This past summer she was kind enough to come down and continue to co-manage the cross country phase at our Pipestave events. I'm thrilled to report that she will be reprising her role again in 2006. I know she had mixed feelings about leaving West Newbury but there can be no better reason to make a change than for love.

Mary Lee is the reason that the WNRDC reformulated again in the early 90's and is directly responsible for my involvement. The WNRDC has been in some form of existence since the 20's but has fallen out of activity several times. In fact, she was instrumental in

the 70's version of the group. She and her late husband, Jerry, had been key players in the purchase of the Cardinal Cushing school in the late 70's by the town which has become our beloved Pipestave Hill/Mill Pond Recreation Area.

I wasn't here in West Newbury in the 70's but I'm sure she was a driving force then. I do know that I went to that first informational meeting at the Town Offices that she and Jerry organized and recognized a wise powerhouse right there. She and Jerry had gotten wind of the fact that other factions were considering placing soccer fields where the rings have sat for over 20 years. They put together the names of every horse person they would find in town and contacted them about coming to the meeting. The need to address this was the catalyst for the Riding and Driving Club re-forming after a dormant period. The club was reborn and quickly developed more facets than just the need to deal with land issues (which as you all know, has been a complicated and successful part of the Club since Day 1). Somehow, Mary Lee and I fell into co-chairship, the long term resident with a wealth of town knowledge and the relatively new kid on the block.

I have learned so much from Mary Lee and have seen her tackle big and complicated issues with vigor and tenacity. She has been active in so many areas besides what you know of her in our Riding and Driving Club. Mary Lee has been there to accomplish (sometimes painfully slowly) amazing things in our town. Thanks to her efforts just since I have known her, often working in conjunction with diverse and divergent groups of people, she has seen the replacement of the bridge over the Indian River down at Riverbend; the completion of the enormously difficult tasks of the Pipestave Hill Land Use Study Committee, including the placement of a conservation restriction on land at Pipestave Hill to save it from development in perpetuity; the replacement of the bridge over the Artichoke leading to Maudsley (she got that one done practically single-handedly with her determination and perseverance over many years!); the conservation of other pieces of land and trail improvement through her years of work on the West Newbury Open Space Committee; production

of the Essex County Trails Association (ECTA) newsletter for many years and active involvement with that organization; maintenance of trails and keeping areas open in her role as West Newbury Liaison for Myopia Hunt; continued focus on easements and keeping trails open by forming and working on the West Newbury Trails Committee; and these are just the big ones that I can think of in this moment! Don't think she has just been a person just doing the persuasive talking to make these things happen... almost all of these have also involved hours of hard physical work as well. Even living away from the area, she is still a board member of the ECTA.

Our little Club has accomplished much too under her stewardship. The Pipestave Hill Three Phase Series became a reality again, with help initially from Gail Majauckas as well, and now provides the only source of income for our Club. From her long ago years as a mom co-founder of Pentucket Pony Club with Judi Winchell, Mary Lee helped to build some of the original fences that form the cross-country course. She has continued on that path as co-manager of the cross country course for the last many years with Jane Kelley. "Manager" in this case also means fence-builder, course marker, hole filler, path clearer, you name it and she even coerced Jerry into helping with the construction on occasion.

Mary Lee also created our newsletter for many years until her commitment to professional newsletters no longer allowed it. As an excellent writer, her newsletters kept members informed in the days before e-mail. And who can forget the wonderful summer barbecues, hosted at her house, wandering through the beautiful gardens, watching kids splash in the pool, looking out at the horses, eating yummy food and enjoying our horse friends. Mary Lee always made those gatherings so enjoyable with her wonderful hospitality and easy manners while getting all the food out and keeping it all organized. In addition, we all know there has never been a work party that Mary Lee has not been front and center for, back issues be damned and has maintained many a trail in town (and she actually knows most of them!).

The day to day of the Riding and Driving Club has happened out of the public eye and is the heart and soul of the organization. I have had the pleasure of

working out details big and small with Mary Lee and have come to depend on her wise counsel. I have learned that it is OK not to agree on everything and to talk it all out and even agree to disagree without hurting the relationship. I so admire the breadth of her understanding of complicated situations and ability to form a path to resolution, and just as importantly, to acknowledge when there is no one resolution. Not only have I grown to adore and respect Mary Lee in our many years of co-chairship, I have had the wonderful opportunity to have her as a beloved friend. I look forward to so many more years of friendship, as I know you all do, as we continue our journeys on more divergent paths. Horses brought us together and horses will keep us connected to this wonderful woman. Thank you from the bottom of my heart, Mary Lee, for all you have given this Club, this town and me.

Meeting Notes November 9, 2005

Twenty-five members attended the November 9th meeting, which was held at Amy Bresky's house. This was the final meeting for 2005, and there were quite a few items for discussion. In addition to club business, everyone enjoyed an equine-theme Yankee swap. A new saddle pad and pair of winter gloves seemed to be the gifts everyone wanted, and were "swapped" several times.

PIPESTAVE

COURSE: There were several important items about Pipestave. First and foremost, **the cross country course will be closed until spring.** The heavy fall rains have made it too wet to remain open. The course will reopen this spring, with the exact date to be determined by Mother Nature. In the meantime, the rings and trails will stay open. For those looking to school cross-country, the ABC-BTA course off Lockwood Lane in Boxford stays open for most of the year. They do request that you not jump in the field.

ADOPT-A-JUMP: The club really wants to promote the "Adopt- A-Jump" program next year. Adopters would be responsible for maintaining and cleaning up around their jump, and would be able to paint it, plant flowers, put up a small sign indicating who they were, etc. Significant changes to fences will be approved by Jane Kelley or Mary Lee Mahoney Camp, our Cross-country Management team, to ensure the course stays safe, as well as horse and rider friendly. Sign-ups for jumps will be in the early spring.

MOWING SCHEDULE: The burden of upkeep throughout the course of the year, particularly in the summer months, tends to fall on the shoulders of a very small group of volunteers. To distribute the work more equally, a regular mowing schedule will be established next spring. Please consider volunteering for a time or two. The club can transport your mower to the fields, and in some cases club members would be willing to lend

a mower to someone willing to drive it.

EAGLE SCOUT BULLETIN BOARDS: There are a couple of Eagle Scout projects that will be done at Pipestave, including some enclosed bulletin boards where notices and maps can be posted, including the WNRDC's. One will be at the top of the hill and the other will be at the lower entrance. Concrete footings have been poured for one of them.

NEW EVENT REFUND POLICY: After some discussion, the group voted on a new refund policy for the Pipestave events. Unfortunately refunding all the entry fees when events need to be cancelled due to weather has strained the club's finances. The large majority of both recognized and unrecognized events do not refund entries due to weather. It was agreed that if an event needs to be cancelled due to weather, entrants would receive a voucher for 50% of their entry fee that could be used at another Pipestave event. The voucher would have no time limit, and could be transferred to someone else. The club would keep the other 50% to cover our costs and allow us to continue to make improvements. It was believed that this was the best way to continue to keep the events affordable, and maintain the club's financial footing.

AFFILIATION WITH ABC-BOLT EVENT: Finally, it was agreed to add the ABC-BTA three phase event (held at Lockwood in Boxford in September) to the Pipestave events for year-end awards. This would give competitor's more flexibility, particularly if an event was cancelled. Competitors will be eligible if they show 2 out of 4 events. ABC-BTA will contribute toward the cost of year-end awards.

OTHER ITEMS

WINTER MEETINGS: Felicity Beech has graciously agreed to organize the winter meetings while Amy retreats from the snow and wind to North Carolina! There were several suggestions for speakers and activities including a barefoot trimmer, driving clinic, trailer driving, emergency preparedness for barn, horse and rider, and an ECTA information session. In addition Jenn Brockway, WNRDC member and law enforcement officer for the MSPCA at Nevins Farm is going to give a talk about their work, and what to do if you see an animal being abused or neglected. TAX EXEMPT STATUS: The club will be seeking to become a registered 501(c) charitable organization with the IRS. This will provide a number of benefits, including exemption from paying sales tax, as well as allowing individuals or businesses who make donations to the club to take a tax deduction. There are several forms that need to be filled out, and some accounting work that needs to be done. Anyone will to volunteer to do this very important project should contact Amy Bresky at 910-692-6111 or amybresky@yahoo.com. Depending on cost, the club may also explore having a paid accountant do the work.

HORSE EMERGENCY FUND: The creation of a horse emergency fund was discussed, but establishing criteria for distribution seemed problematic. A suggestion was made that we establish a sub-committee to come up with some plans for fundraisers that could be quickly implemented if a member had an emergency. More details on this will be forthcoming.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS: Several members noted that all horses and riders should have identification on them, particularly when trail riding. A small tag on your saddle as well as something on your person should note your name, address and emergency phone number. This can prove invaluable in the case of a loose horse or down rider. As this is such an important topic, we decided to dedicate a future meeting to it.

T-SHIRTS & HATS: The club has some leftover hats and t-shirts. The T-shirts are green cotton, and have the Pipestave logo. Sizes medium and large are left and can be purchased for \$10.00 each. The hats were going to be sold at the October 9th Pipestave event (that was cancelled) to support Hurricane Katrina relief efforts. The hats are green and tan, and have the Pipestave logo, as well as Hurricane Katrina along the back. They are not dated, so can be sold or used as volunteer gifts next year as well. Both of these make great holiday stocking stuffers!!

2006 LOCAL EQUINE ACTIVITIES CALENDAR: For several years the club has distributed a listing of local equestrian events free of charge as a public service. The calendar contains many clinics and non-recognized events, and has been a huge benefit to both show organizers and riders. The costs associated with printing and mailing this calendar have risen over the years, and it now costs the club more than \$1200 to do

this. It was agreed that for 2006 there will be a nominal fee for listing an event. Amy Bresky will contact the show managers with this change.

FINANCES: Although we are showing an end of year deficit, there was some money left over from last year, so the club does still have a small amount of cash in its account! Because we have had to cancel events for the past to years and installed the new vinyl fence this year, there is not enough money for the club to donate to any of the charities we've supported in the past. Hopefully, our new refund policy listed above will help with this situation in the future. If you would like a copy of the treasurer's report, contact Amy.

MISCELLANEOUS: There were several other suggestions and ideas that merited more discussion, but the hour was growing late and everyone was ready to move onto the Yankee Swap! It was suggested that the club host a pleasure show at Pipestave. To have a successful show, more volunteers would need to be involved, as many members already volunteer at all the Pipestave events. It was also suggested that subcommittees be formed to allow members to get involved in areas they were directly interested in. One of the suggestions was a trail riding committee, who could organize group rides in the area on a more regular basis. Remember to keep your membership up to date so you can take advantage of our fun activities! Membership must be current to receive the newsletter.

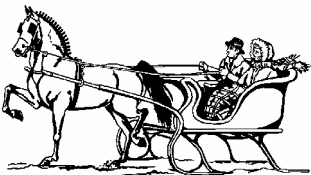
ECTA—A Message from West Newbury Area Reps by George MacGown
