MSPCA Rescue Glide Demonstration

On a lovely Sunday afternoon, June 7th, Brenda Bonnette came to Riverrun Farm in West Newbury to demonstrate the MSPCA's Rescue Glide. WNRDC Members and a large representation from the WN Fire Department came to learn how to rescue a downed horse outside and then in a stall. The MSPCA developed and distributes the original Rescue Glide, changing the way they move downed horses. This innovation provides a streamlined way to humanely move these at risk animals. Horses who previously had no chance of survival can now be safely and easily transported to a veterinary hospital. The Rescue Glide has revolutionized emergency equine transport across North America. Brenda gave made the attendees hands on experience to work with the rescue equipment. Walked them through two rescue scenarios. First, they put "Lucky the horse", a training mannequin that weighs about 800 pounds onto the glide and in the trailer. The second scenario was how to rescue a downed horse out of a stall. It was a great learning experience and we would like to thank Brenda and MSPCA and Kathy Feehery of Riverrun for making this possible and we also thank the Fire Chief Berkenbush and the all the Rescue personnel who attended. Did you say “Horsewoman”?

I was laid off in January 2008 from a job I loved and was also very unique. I knew I had a lot of interviews in my future, and like most people, I would have preferred to schedule root canals. For those of you who have not been interviewed lately by the dreaded *Human Resources* person, the big trend seems to be phone interviews and the one-word description of yourself. It is like the beauty pageant question where you have to answer “World Peace” to be in the top five.

Well, there I am on the phone with a total stranger validating myself as a worthy employee and human being when she asks, “What one word would you use to describe yourself?” I have to admit I was tired after having gotten back late from the barn patching up “Booboos Horsey”, (a.k.a. Q) the night before. Without hesitation out of my mouth came “Horsewoman”. Dead silence from the interviewer, then a puzzled voice asked, “Did you say horsewoman?” I knew there was only one way to go now I had committed myself in that direction so I responded, “Yes, horsewoman.” She of course wanted me to elaborate, so here is what I said:

“I’m a horsewoman.

When I see something that’s broken - I fix it.

If it is in the way - I move it.

If it is going to be a problem later on - I stop it from happening.

I teach others how to do things in case I am not there to do it.

Most importantly, when everything is hitting the fan I stay calm.

In a crisis or emergency I break the problem down into manageable sections and take care of it, piece by piece. I have learned that through experience.

When I think I can’t possibly get it done - I do – I find a way because I have to.

If things are bad and the ride gets rough I get better. I get stronger. I adjust and get back on course. There is no other choice.

I’m a horsewoman.”

Having an existence with a horse proves a great deal about the type of person you are.

You realize you learn more from your failures than successes.

You learn that if you don’t try you’ll never get anything done.

You accept sometimes it will take many tries to get things done right.

You know doing something right is the only way to do anything.

You understand today’s challenges will be different than those of yesterday’s and tomorrow’s.

You can plan all you want but can never control everything – especially forces of nature.

You have to be able to adjust and change and continue on.

Most importantly you realize it’s best to take one gait, one jump, one horse at a time.

You have to believe in yourself and do not accept something just because it is easier that way.

You get things done when others would not even try.

I told the interviewer that is why “horsewoman” is how I describe myself. To my surprise the interviewer wanted to schedule my next interview almost immediately. I thought about what I had said and decided to take my own advice. I told her I really appreciated the offer of a second interview but

I was overqualified for the job. I thanked her for her time. She thanked me. She said she would always remember my unusual answer. She should, it came from a **horsewoman**.

In Memory of Todd Johnson

The agricultural community of West Newbury and surrounds lost a great friend last week with the passing of Todd Johnson at 47 from melanoma. While not a West Newbury Riding and Driving Club member, he was well-known to most all horse owners in town as a man who worked hard to maintain West Newbury's agricultural roots. He supplied local hay to many of our members and could often be seen going down the road on a tractor hauling an open trailer piled high with newly baled hay. Todd helped the West Newbury Riding and Driving Club through the years, mowing and haying for us, and helping install gates and fences. His well-written obituary in the Newburyport Daily News describes him well. Todd was "a natural outdoorsman, enjoying horse logging and operating horse-powered farm products. He possessed a remarkable fix-it self-efficiency: A yes-we-can attitude that gained him the popularity he enjoyed from many friends and neighbors that sought his talents. Those who knew him will remember him as a selfless individual whose generosity and kindness will not be soon forgotten."

I attended his funeral with Jill Hazard and Jack and Ellen Alden. The small church was overflowing with people and it was especially touching when so many got up to tell of their connection with Todd. It was so clear that the man gave of himself in any way he could. Many young people got up, holding back tears, saying Todd was there for them at the lowest point in their lives. And he was there on his terms, calling at odd hours, sitting on doorsteps until the person would come out to talk, buying diapers for new moms. In each case, he had touched them deeply by giving of himself.

Long-time WNRDC member, Ellen Alden, summed everyone's feelings up well, "Todd left a wonderful legacy, and that is so important to convey to people. My husband, Jack, reminded me about the time my trailer detached from the truck in the driveway with my horses Buddy and Echo loaded, and he and a friend were trying to resolve the problem, when Todd drove by. He noticed the problem, turned around and instantly was there to help, despite where he was headed at the time. He had a tough life in many ways, and he was by no means perfect (who is?), however, as we heard at the funeral, many people were helped by him, and perhaps their lives were changed by his generosity."

Tim Allen on Crane Neck Street, spoke at the funeral of Todd's dedication in turning Tim's overgrown, poison ivy infested back area into a beautiful and productive hayfield which has been known as Todd's Field ever since. Tim made us all laugh remembering how Todd worked on his own not-to-be fathomed time schedule and that his equipment was forever breaking. Tim captured him well when he said that when he, like so many others in town, now hears a tractor chugging down Crane Neck St., he can't believe it's not Todd.

Chair of the Mill Pond Committee, Charlie Reynolds, remembers him this way, "Todd was a friend of the Mill Pond Committee and our feature attraction at many of our Winter Carnivals. Todd, with his two large work horses, ran sleigh rides and sometimes hay rides. Todd worked out of Long Hill Orchard and drove hay rides and tractor rides during apple harvest season and Haunted Halloween events. He also did much of the hay field preparation work at after Mill Pond was dredged and we have him to thank for the success of that field. Todd suggested the sign that is currently placed at the hay field so that visitors will treat it with respect."

Todd was married to Michelle for 21 years and had three sons, Todd Cox, and Travis and Grand Johnson. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to the Todd Johnson Memorial Fund, c/o The Provident Bank, 5 Market St., Amesbury, MA 01913.

Marlene and Christopher Stasinios have been involved with animals and farming since they were very young. "Horses have always been mystical to me," she admits and describes herself as a horse enthusiast since birth. As a child, she mucked stalls in exchange for the opportunity to ride at the nearby stables. Marlene owned her previous horse for 21 years and now has an 8 year old Spotted Saddle Horse, with whom she enjoys western pleasure riding. "She is an amazing horse; so comfortable to ride and she really loves people," says Marlene of her mare. She fondly calls her "Cocoa Bella" because she's the color of hot chocolate with white splashes like marshmallows! She also has a white "bell shaped" marking at the top of her rump.

Marlene's husband, Chris, a third generation farmer, learned the trade beside his grandfather. At the age of 9, he would even grow his own corn and sell it from his little red wagon. Having traded in his wagon for big tractors, Chris now does land excavation for horse owners by clearing and leveling land for riding arenas and restoring paddocks.

Together, Marlene and Chris run a family farm where they grow hay and vegetables on 200 acres in Boxford and elsewhere; they raise chickens and pigs that keep company with a pet goat, Rosie, who doesn't really smell like a rose, and of course, Bella. Along with all the other garden veggies, they planted 15,000 tomatoes and 40 acres of Butternut Squash. Oh, and don't forget Great Pumpkins. Chris has won top prizes at the Topsfield Fair for his Beefsteak Tomatoes and Sweet Corn.

Still considered a "backyard farm", they sell from two farm stands this year; one is at 11 Lake Street, Peabody, and at their home on 22 South Cross Road, Bradford which is near the Bradford ski hill. Here one will find fresh picked vegetables, as well as free range eggs, turkey and pork. It's a great place to bring children to see the farm animals.

Here are the brief details:

This is a non-competitive, fun, team ADVENTURE trail ride on the lovely trails and fields at Pipestave Hill and the surrounding area. Last year we had 86 riders and many are planning to come back for another no-pressure, laughter-filled day.

In a team of two to four riders you will ride a course of 3+ miles through trails and fields. Along the way, you will encounter challenges – tests, obstacles, and jumps – similar to those you might encounter on any trail ride. Each challenge is optional, so riders of all levels can participate.

The Adventure Trail is not timed or scored. Travel at your own pace! There will be one or two mandatory check-in points. Spotters (volunteers!) will be on course to assist with directions and safety.

This event will be held rain or shine with the course adjusted as needed for safety.

Entry Fee: \$30 per person, pre-registered; \$35 on the day.

When: Sunday, August 16: Morning start times 9:00 AM – 12:00 PM

Last year we had 86 riders and expect more this year. Pre-registration is recommended so that we can give you a start time.

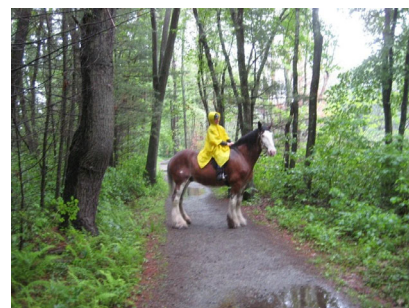

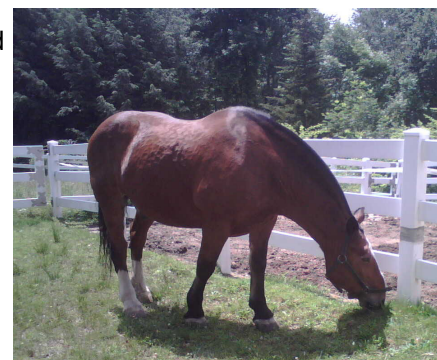

Update on Boston Mounted Police Unit: Unfortunately we lost the battle with City Hall and the Boston Mounted Unit was disbanded (even though the Red Sox offered \$400,000 to which the Mayor said "No Thank You!"). The Police Commissioner and City Council have said that they want to bring the unit back eventually. Five of the horses went to Plymouth County Sheriff's Mounted Unit, one went to Arlington Cemetery, one to the City of Pinellas Park Mounted Unit in Florida, two to St. Petersburg, Florida Mounted Unit, two went back to their original owners, and the oldest one at age 26, Captain, was adopted by my non-profit organization, Mint for Mounts. Cappy is settling in nicely into his new country life in West Newbury. He was fostered for two weeks by Bill and Bernadette Hamilton before going to his permanent home. Our non-profit organization will continue and is raising money for retired working horses such as Captain or other horses in need.
